Background: Federal Grant Funding

- Five-year Discretionary Competitive grant through DHHS Administration on Children, Youth, and Families – Children's Bureau
- Focus is on system changes to improve family preservation and reunification rates through the implementation of ICWA best practices
- Children's Bureau gave 5 awards nationwide to begin in Federal FY24 (October 2023)



Background: Initiative Purpose

- Reduce the disproportionate number of Alaska Native and American Indian children in foster care
- Generate evidence for how to effectively implement best practices in child welfare
- Co-design, implement and test (evaluate) the ICWA Practice model to ensure transparency, common understanding, collaboration, and trust

- Guide the development of a training and coaching curriculum

Initiative Goals

- Stabilize implementation of ICWA across the child welfare spectrum (prevention, custody, to reunification) thru the development of an ICWA Practice Model
- Improve cultural competency and develop a training curriculum
- •Records management of initiative deliverables and curriculum



Initiative Goals: All Throughout the Work

- Pre-post surveys, interviews, focus groups- caseworkers, supervisors, service recipients, community partners, court staff




Initiative Update: Phase I – In Progress

- Identify regional focus group participants with lived experience
- Community sharing circles (focus groups)
- Analyzing data
- Sharing results with Tribes and our broader group



Initiative Update: Phase I -Regional Advisory Meetings






Initiative Update: Sample Court Questions

- How can judges be more compassionate and understanding of families?
- How can judges create a safe space and culturally responsive and respectful space for families to come to?
- How did the legal parties involved impact your experience?
- Did the tribe intervene?
- Did the Tribe have an attorney?
- Did the Tribe participate?
- If parents did not participate, what could have been done to encourage involvement?



Initiative Next Steps: Phase

- Development of (regional and statewide) ICWA practice model(s)
- Curriculum building



Building a Community Based Relational ICWA Practice Model

- Connectedness Framework (family, community, environmental, intergenerational, spiritual/cultural and internal connectedness)
- ICWA- (prevention, preference placements, active efforts, legal criteria, cultural connectedness)
- Relational Worldview (mind, body, spirit, context)
- Rural v Urban context
- Traditional values (vary by community)
- Strengthening Families Protective Factors (concrete support, social connections, parental resilience, social emotional competence of children, parenting knowledge)

Initiative Next Steps: Phase III – Final Stages

- Training and Coaching- Perhaps
 involve community partners
- Implementation of the Practice Model in multiple spaces
- Why is this different from other practice models?
 - Full child welfare spectrum (wellbeing to permanency)
 - Inclusion of lived experience
 - Regional Tribal partnerships
 - Community driven
